AN ACT

GRANTING FREE FUNERAL SERVICES TO POOR FAMILIES, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

- Section 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "Free Funeral Services

 Act."
- Sec. 2. Declaration of Policy. It is the policy of the State to promote a just and dynamic social order that will ensure the prosperity and independence of the nation and free the people from poverty through policies that provide adequate social services, promote full employment, a rising standard of living, and an improved quality of life for all. As part of fulfilling this, the State shall give free funeral services to poor
- 8 families who cannot afford a proper burial for the deceased.

Sec 3. Definition of Terms— The following terms as used in this Act shall mean the following:

- a. Poor refers to those family whose income falls below the poverty threshold as
 defined by the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) and/or who
 cannot afford in a sustained manner to provide their minimum basic needs of
 food, health, education, housing, or other essential amenities of life as defined
 under Republic Act No. 8425, otherwise known as the "Social Reform and
 Poverty Alleviation Act".
 - b. Funeral Services refer to the preparation of funeral documents, embalming, interment or burial services, transport, cremation, and inurnment services, including the provision of a casket or urn and venue, as the case may be, offered by mortuaries.
 - c. Funeral Establishment includes funeral parlors, funeral chapels and any similar place used in the preparation, storage and care of the body of a deceased person for burial or cremation.
 - **Sec 4. Coverage.** Families whose income falls below the poverty threshold as defined by the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) and/or who cannot afford in a sustained manner to provide their minimum basic needs of food, health, education, housing, or other essential amenities of life as defined under Republic Act No. 8425, otherwise known as the "Social Reform and Poverty Alleviation Act".
- Sec 5. Free Funeral Services for Poor Families. Free funeral services
 shall be provided for poor families by accredited funeral establishments anywhere in

- the country. The said free funeral services shall be given to only one (1) family member per month per funeral establishment. Provided that, in coordination with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), every funeral establishment shall have an indigent funeral package which shall be uniform in all funeral establishments regardless of its type or location that shall be available to all poor families, as determined by the DSWD.
 - Sec 6. Requirements for Availing Free Funeral Services. —The deceased family must present a Certificate of Indigency and a case study verifying their indigent status from either the medical social service of a hospital, the local social welfare office or the DSWD to the funeral establishment in order to avail of the free funeral service package.

- **Sec. 7. Lead Agency.** The DSWD shall be the lead agency in the implementation of the provisions of this Act and shall engage in the funeral services of funeral establishments in the country.
- **Sec. 8. Reimbursement.** Funeral establishments granting free services to poor beneficiaries may seek reimbursement for the cost of the services from any regional office of the DSWD upon the approval of the Regional Director. The reimbursement will be based on the stipulations of the signed contract between the poor family, the mortuary, and authorized DSWD personnel.
- **Sec. 9. Penalties.** Any violation of this Act shall be penalized with a fine not exceeding Two hundred thousand pesos (P200,000.00) and a suspension of license to operate for a period not exceeding six (6) months.

- 1 Repetitive violations after the lifting of the suspension of its license to operate
- 2 shall be penalized with a fine not exceeding Four hundred thousand pesos
- 3 (P400,000.00) and a revocation of such license to operate.
- 4 **Sec. 10. Appropriations.** The amount necessary for the initial
- 5 implementation of this Act shall be charged against the current year's appropriations
- 6 for the Assistance to Individuals In Crisis Situations (AICS) Program and other similar
- 7 programs of the DSWD. Thereafter, such amount, as may be necessary, shall be
- 8 included in the annual General Appropriations Act.
- 9 **Sec. 20. Separability Clause**. —If any portion or provision of the Act is
- declared void or unconstitutional, the remaining portions or provisions hereof shall
- 11 not be affected by such declaration.
- Sec. 21. Repealing Clause. Any provision of law or regulations
- inconsistent herewith is hereby released, modified, or amended accordingly.
- Sec. 21. Effectivity. This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
- publication in two (2) newspapers of general circulation.
