## RESOLUTION

DIRECTING THE APPROPRIATE SENATE COMMITTEES TO CONDUCT AN INQUIRY, IN AID OF LEGISLATION, INTO THE KILLING OF MINORS IN POLICE OPERATIONS AND ENCOUNTERS TOWARDS REVIEWING GOVERNMENT POLICY, REFORMING POLICE PROCEDURES, AND ULTIMATELY PROTECTING THE LIVES OF FILIPINO CHILDREN AND YOUTH

WHEREAS, according to the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, "everyone has the right to life, liberty, and security of person;"

WHEREAS, the right to life and other human rights especially for a child is further protected in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. Article 4 of the Convention provides that the State has the responsibility to make sure that all measures are taken to ensure that all the rights of the child are respected, protected, and realized. Given that the Philippines is a party to the Convention, the State has agreed to review existing laws related to children, assess and take the needed steps to guarantee that all related services meet the minimum standards set forth by the Convention, assist the family in safeguarding these rights, and create an environment conducive for the proper growth and development of children;

WHEREAS, under Article II, Section 4 of the 1987 Philippine Constitution, it is the prime duty of the Government to serve and protect the people;

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 5 of the Constitution declares that the maintenance of peace and order, the protection of life, liberty, and property, and promotion of the general welfare are essential for the enjoyment by all the people of the blessings of democracy;

WHEREAS, in accordance with Article II, Section 13 of the Constitution, the State recognizes the role of the youth in nation-building and shall promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual, and social well-being;

**WHEREAS**, under Republic Act No. 9344 Section 2 (b) or the Juvenile Justice and Welfare Act of 2006, it is the policy of the State to "protect the best interests of the child through measures that will ensure the observance of international standards of child protection, especially those to which the Philippines is a party;"

**WHEREAS**, it is also stated under Republic Act No. 9344 Section 2 (c) that "The State likewise recognizes the right of children to assistance, including proper care and nutrition, and special protection from all forms of neglect, abuse, cruelty and exploitation, and other conditions prejudicial to their development;"

WHEREAS, according to a report on *Interaksyon*, on 17 August 2018, Joshua Laxamana, 17 years old, was shot during an alleged shootout with police on the Tarlac–Pangasinan–La Union Expressway (TPLEx) access road;

**WHEREAS**, according to the police, Joshua was carrying drugs and firearms, and was an *Akyat Bahay* gang member, who supposedly ignored a police checkpoint and fired shots at manning police officers in Barangay Poblacion, Balungao. However, Joshua's mother and friends maintain that Joshua was simply on his way home from Baguio City to his home in Tarlac City with two friends after participating in a Defence of the Ancients 2 (DOTA 2) tournament;

**WHEREAS**, one of his two companions, Julius Sebastian, 15 years old, is reported to still be missing while their third companion, who has not been named by media, made it home safely after getting separated from Joshua and Julius along TLPEx, where he stopped for a rest before continuing the journey home;

WHEREAS, it has also been reported that on 29 July 2018, 18-year old Christian Dhel Braganza along with friends, 17-year old Lee James Burgos and 20-year old Ramil Sabalboro, were shot dead by police in Panay Avenue in Quezon City

- in what was reported by the police to be a shootout with the police. The latter
- 2 claimed that they had stumbled upon the three robbing a woman. There was a
- 3 fourth victim, 57-year old George Marcelino, who was caught in the crossfire and
- died on the way to the hospital;

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- WHEREAS, there have been other reports of the death of minors during police encounters and investigations especially in the last two years;
- WHEREAS, as of April 2018, the Children's Legal Rights and Development
  Center (CLRDC) said that at least 74 minors, including 56 boys and 18 girls, have
  been killed in police operations and vigilante-style attacks from July 2016 to
  December 2017;
- WHEREAS, most widely reported were news about the deaths of 17-year old
  Kian Loyd delos Santos, who was killed by police officers on 16 August 2017 during
  a drug raid; of 19-year old Carl Arnaiz who was also killed by police officers
  supposedly following a shoot-out on 18 August 2017; and of 14-year old Reynaldo
  de Guzman, Carl's companion on the night of August 18, who was found dead in a
  creek in Barangay San Roque, Gapan, Nueva Ecija on 6 September 2017. One year
  later, their cases remain unresolved;
  - WHEREAS, on 22 August 2017, the Senate adopted Senate Resolution No. 471 to fully express their concern and condemnation of the series of deaths especially that of children at the hands of the police during various encounters and operations;
  - WHEREAS, on 25 September 2017, the Senate also adopted Senate Resolution No. 516 to conduct an inquiry into these deaths and to urge the government to carry out the needed actions to reduce the series of deaths, especially of minors, in police operations;
  - WHEREAS, with continued reports coming in of minors killed by the police, there is an evident need to pursue the Senate's earlier call to investigate these senseless killings of Filipino children and youth, and to identify immediate and concrete policy actions to avert these;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED** by the Senate of the Philippines, to direct the appropriate Senate Committees to conduct an inquiry, in aid of legislation, into the killing of minors in police operations and encounters towards reviewing government policy, reforming police procedures, and ultimately protecting the lives of Filipino children and youth.
