AN ACT

STRENGTHENING THE CONSERVATION AND PROTECTION OF NATIONAL CULTURAL HERITAGE THROUGH ENHANCED CULTURAL HERITAGE EDUCATION PROGRAMS AND CULTURAL MAPPING, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10066 OR THE NATIONAL CULTURAL HERITAGE ACT OF 2009

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Culture is the narrative that binds Filipinos, regardless of ethnicity, social class, or educational background, into a common chronicle of tradition, trials, and triumph. It is a story of our nation's journey throughout the centuries.

UNESCO has recognized cultural mapping as a crucial tool and technique in preserving the world's tangible and intangible cultural assets.¹ The documentation of these cultural elements covers a wide range of areas, namely: (1) built heritage such as architecture, (2) tangible heritage such as traditional dwellings, (3) intangible heritage such as indigenous skills, and (4) natural heritage. The fundamental goal of cultural mapping is to educate and help the nation visualize its rich heritage while allowing for the reflection of what it stands to lose as a result of its collective apathy.

To further strengthen heritage conservation in the country, this bill seeks to amend Republic Act No. 10066, otherwise known as the "National Cultural Heritage Act

of 2009", to mandate local government units (LGUs) to conduct a cultural heritage mapping of their areas for both tangible and intangible, and natural and built heritage.

For the above-cited reasons, the passage of this bill is urgently sought.

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Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Republic of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

Section. 1. Section 3 of Republic Act No. 10066, otherwise known as the
"National Cultural Heritage Act of 2009," is hereby amended to read as follows:
"SEC. 3. Definition of Terms For purposes of this Act, the following
terms shall be defined as follows:
(a) "Adaptive reuse" shall refer to the utilization of buildings, other
built-structures, and sites of value for purposes other than those
that were originally intended to conserve the site, their engineering
integrity, and their design authenticity.
(b) "Anthropological area" shall refer to any place where studies of
specific ethnolinguistic groups are undertaken, the properties of
which are of value to our cultural heritage.
(c) "Antique" shall refer to a cultural property found locally which is
one hundred (100) years in age, more or less, the production of
which has ceased.
(d) "Archaeological area" shall refer to any place, whether above or
underground, underwater or at sea level, containing fossils,

artifacts and other cultural, geological, botanical, and zoological materials which depict and document culturally relevant paleontological, prehistoric, and/or historic events.

- (e) "Archives" shall refer to public and private records in any format which have been selected for permanent preservation because of their evidential, historical informational value; otherwise known as archival materials collections or archival holdings; the place (building/room/storage area) where archival materials are kept and preserved; and an organization or agency or part thereof whose main responsibility is to appraise, arrange, describe, conserve, promote and make archival materials available for reference and research, also known as archival agency
- (f) "Built heritage/TANGIBLE HERITAGE" shall refer to architectural and engineering structures such as, but not limited to, bridges, government buildings, houses of ancestry, traditional dwellings, quartels, train stations, lighthouses, small ports, educational, technological, and industrial complexes, and their settings, and landscapes with notable historical and cultural significance. PROTECTION OF THESE STRUCTURES SHALL ALSO TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION THE MAINTENANCE OF THE INTEGRITY OF ITS VISUAL CORRIDOR AND/OR LINE OF SIGHT.
- (g) "Collector" shall refer to any person or institution that acquires cultural property for purposes other than sale.
- (h) "Commission" shall refer to the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA).
- (i) "Conservation" shall refer to all the processes and measures of maintaining the cultural significance of cultural property, including but not limited to the preservation, restoration, reconstruction, protection, adaptation, or any combination thereof.
- (j) "Cultural agencies" shall refer to the following national government agencies with their specific areas of responsibility:

1	National Museum (cultural property); the National Library
2	(books); National Historical Institute (Philippine history); National
3	Archives (documents); Cultural Center of the Philippines (culture
4	and the arts); and Komisyon sa Wikang Filipino (language).
5	(k) "Cultural education" shall refer to the teaching and learning of
6	cultural concepts and processes.
7	(l) "Cultural heritage" shall refer to the totality of cultural property
8	preserved and developed through time and passed on to posterity.
9	(M) "CULTURAL HERITAGE MAPPING" SHALL REFER TO THE
10	APPROACH USED TO IDENTIFY, RECORD, AND USE
11	CULTURAL RESOURCES AND ACTIVITIES FOR BUILDING
12	COMMUNITIES. IT IS A SET OF ACTIVITIES AND
13	PROCESSES FOR EXPLORING, DISCOVERING,
14	DOCUMENTING, EXAMINING, ANALYZING,
15	INTERPRETING, PRESENTING AND SHARING
16	INFORMATION RELATED TO PEOPLE, COMMUNITIES,
17	SOCIETIES, PLACES AND THE MATERIAL PRODUCTS AND
18	PRACTICES ASSOCIATED WITH THE PEOPLE AND PLACES.
19	[(m)] (N) "Cultural heritage worker" shall refer to an individual
20	undertaking cultural heritage work.
21	[(n)] (O) "Cultural institution" shall refer to entities engaged primarily
22	in cultural work.
23	[(o)] (P) "Cultural property" shall refer to all products of human
24	creativity by which a people and a nation reveal their identity,
25	including churches, mosques and other places of religious worship,
26	schools and natural history specimens and sites, whether public or
27	privately-owned, movable or immovable, and tangible or
28	intangible.
29	[(p)] (Q) "Dealers" shall refer to natural or juridical persons who
30	acquire cultural property for the purpose of engaging in the
31	acquisition and disposition of the same.

1	[(q)] (R) "Heritage zone" shall refer to historical, anthropological,
2	archaeological, artistic geographical areas and settings that are
3	culturally significant to the country, as declared by the National
4	Museum and/or the National Historical Institute.
5	[(r)] (S) "History" shall refer to a written record of past events relating
6	to Philippine history.
7	[(s)] (T) "Historical landmarks" shall refer to sites or structures that are
8	associated with events or achievements significant to Philippine
9	history as declared by the National Historical Institute.
10	[(t)] (U) "Historical monuments" shall refer to structures that honor
11	illustrious persons or commemorate events of historical value as
12	declared by the National Historical Institute.
13	[(u)] (V) "Historical shrines" shall refer to historical sites or structures
14	hallowed and revered for their history or association as declared by
15	the National Historical Institute.
16	[(v)] (W) "Historical street name" shall refer to a street name that has
17	been in existence for at least fifty (50) years and over time has been
18	considered historic.
19	[(w)] (X) "Important cultural property" shall refer to a cultural property
20	having exceptional cultural, artistic, and historical significance to
21	the Philippines, as shall be determined by the National Museum
22	and/or National Historical Institute.
23	[(x)] (Y) "Intangible cultural heritage" shall refer to the practices,
24	representations, expressions, knowledge, and skills, as well as the
25	instruments, objects, and artifacts associated therewith, that
26	communities, groups, and individuals recognize as part of their
27	cultural heritage, such as: (1) oral traditions, languages and
28	expressions; (2) performing arts; (3) social practices, rituals, and
29	festive events; (4) knowledge and practices concerning nature and
30	the universe; and (5) traditional craftsmanship.
31	[(y)] (Z) "Intangible cultural property" shall refer to the peoples'
32	learned processes along with the knowledge, skills and creativity

1	that inform and are developed by them, the products they create
2	and the resources, spaces, and other aspects of social and natural
3	context necessary for their sustainability.
4	[(z)] (AA) "Library" shall refer to an institution where the collection of
5	books, manuscripts, computerized information, and other materials
6	are organized to provide physical, bibliographic and/or intellectual
7	access to the public, with a librarian that is trained to provide
8	services and programs related to the information needs of its
9	clientele.
10	[(aa)] (BB) "Museum" shall refer to a permanent institution that
11	researches, acquires, conserves, communicates, and exhibits the
12	material evidence of humans and their environment for purposes
13	of education or leisure.
14	[(bb)] (CC) "National cultural treasure" shall refer to a unique cultural
15	property found locally, possessing outstanding historical, cultural,
16	artistic and/ or scientific value which is highly significant and
17	important to the country and nation, and officially declared as such
18	by the pertinent cultural agency.
19	[(cc)] (DD) "Nationally significant" shall refer to historical, aesthetic,
20	scientific, technical, social and/ or spiritual values that unify the
21	nation by a deep sense of pride in their various yet common
22	identities, cultural heritage, and national patrimony.
23	(EE) "NATURAL HERITAGE" SHALL REFER TO THE FLORA AND
24	FAUNA, THE NATURAL BIOLOGICAL AND PHYSICAL
25	COMPONENTS OF THE ENVIRONMENT, AND OTHER
26	RELATED ECOSYSTEMS AND BIODIVERSITY, WHETHER
27	TERRESTRIAL, WETLAND, OR MARINE.
28	[(dd)] (FF) "Natural property of cultural significance" shall refer to
29	areas possessing outstanding ecosystems with flora and fauna of
30	national scientific importance under the National Integrated
31	Protected Areas System.

1	[(ee)] (GG) NCCA Fortal Cultural Databank refers to the specific
2	domain in the Commission's intranet for cultural information that
3	is accessed only internally with control and confidentiality. It
4	includes the registry of national cultural property
5	[(ff)] (HH) "Prehistory" shall refer to the period of human history before
6	the introduction of the forms of writing.
7	[(gg)] (II) "Registry" shall refer to the Philippine Registry of Cultural
8	Property which is the registry of all cultural property of the country
9	deemed of significant importance to our cultural heritage.
10	[(hh)] (JJ) "Restoration" shall refer to the action taken or the technical
11	intervention to correct deterioration and alterations.
12	[(ii)] (KK) "Tangible cultural property" shall refer to a cultural property
13	with historical, archival, anthropological, archaeological, artistic,
14	and architectural value, and with exceptional or traditional
15	production, whether of Philippine origin or not, including antiques
16	and natural history specimens with significant value."
17	Sec. 2. A new Section 14 of R.A. No. 10066 is hereby inserted to read as follows:
18	"ARTICLE V
19	CULTURAL MAPPING
20	SEC. 14. CULTURAL MAPPING BY LOCAL GOVERNMENT
21	UNITS LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNITS ARE HEREBY MANDATED
22	TO CONDUCT A COMPREHENSIVE CULTURAL HERITAGE
23	MAPPING OF THEIR AREAS, INCLUDING TANGIBLE AND
24	INTANGIBLE HERITAGE AND NATURAL AND BUILT HERITAGE
25	STRUCTURES. THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNITS SHALL
26	MOBILIZE AND PARTNER WITH CONCERNED AGENCIES TO
27	ENSURE PROMPT AND EFFECTIVE IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS
28	ACT. ALL FINDINGS AND OUTPUTS SHALL BE SUBMITTED AND
29	REGISTERED IN THE PHILIPPINE REGISTRY OF CULTURAL
30	PROPERTY.
31	APART FROM CULTURAL AGENCIES, LOCAL
32	GOVERNMENT UNITS ARE ALSO ENJOINED TO WORK WITH

1	THE FOLLOWING AGENCIES FOR THE CONDUCT OF CULTURAL
2	MAPPING:
3	(A)COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION (CHED) FOR
4	INSTITUTING CULTURAL AWARENESS IN STATE
5	UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES;
6	(B) DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (DA) FOR THE
7	INVENTORY OF NATURAL FIBER IN THE COUNTRY;
8	(C) DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (DEPED) FOR INSTITUTING
9	CULTURAL AWARENESS IN BASIC EDUCATION;
10	(D)DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL
11	RESOURCES (DENR) FOR THE INVENTORY OF NATURAL
12	PARKS, BIODIVERSITY AND ENDEMICITY;
13	(E) DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS
14	(DPWH) FOR ITS PROGRAMS ON HERITAGE ZONES AND
15	SITES AND PLACES OF SIGNIFICANCE;
16	(F) DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (DOST)
17	FOR ITS INVENTORY OF NATURAL SOURCES OF DYES
18	AND OTHER PERTINENT RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT
19	FOR THE TEXTILE INDUSTRY SECTOR IN THE COUNTRY;
20	(G)DEPARTMENT OF TOURISM (DOT) FOR THEIR EXISTING
21	TOURISM PLANS FOR DECLARED NATIONAL AND
22	WORLD HERITAGE SITES."
23	The succeeding sections shall be renumbered accordingly.
24	Sec. 3. Section 39 of R.A. No. 10066 is hereby amended to read as follows:
25	"SEC. 39. Cultural Heritage Education Programs Within one (1) year
26	from the effectivity of this Act, the Department of Education, the Technical
27	Education and Skills Development Authority and the Commission on
28	Higher Education, in consultation with the Commission, shall set forth in
29	its teaching programs nationwide the following cultural heritage
30	education programs with emphasis at the provincial, city and municipal
31	levels:

1	(a) Protection, conservation and preservation of cultural heritage
2	properties;
3	(b) Instructional materials in print, film, and broadcast media on the
4	cultural and historical significance of cultural properties; [and]
5	(C) INDIGENOUS KNOWLEDGE SYSTEMS, SKILLS, AND
6	PRACTICES (IKSSP) THROUGH THE APPROPRIATE
7	"SCHOOLS OF LMNG TRADITIONS (SLTS)" MODELS; AND
8	[(c)] (D) Visitation, public accessibility, and information dissemination
9	on designated local cultural properties."
10	Sec. 4. Separability Clause If any provision of this Act shall be declared
11	unconstitutional or invalid, the other provisions or parts thereof not otherwise
12	affected shall remain in full force and effect.
13	Sec. 5. Repealing Clause All laws, decrees, executive orders, or rules and
14	regulations contrary to or inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed, amended or
15	modified accordingly.
16	Sec. 6. Effectivity Clause This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its
17	complete publication either in the Official Gazette or in at least two (2) newspapers of
18	general circulation.
